# Find Community-Based Legal Assistance and English Language Classes

# Fight Crime and Discrimination in New York State

New Yorkers are encouraged to report incidents of bias and discrimination across the state and to file a complaint with the State Division of Human Rights by calling the State's toll-free hotline at **1-888-392-3644** from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday - Friday. If you need to report a crime or fear for your safety, call 911 immediately.

# **Report Human Trafficking**

If you suspect that you are someone you know may be a victim of human trafficking, call the National Human Trafficking Hotline 1-888-373-7888 for free and confidential help in 170 languages or text HELP or INFO to BeFree (233733).

## **Report Housing Discrimination**

The Fair and Equitable Housing Office (FEHO) was established January 2015. FEHO seeks to ensure that New Yorkers have an equal opportunity to live in housing they desire and can afford regardless of race, color, familial status, religion, sex, disabilities, national origin, marital status, age, and sexual orientation. # **Find Immigration Legal Services**

# **CONSUMER PROTECTION**

## **Fight Immigration Fraud**

Beware of scammers and attorneys seeking to take advantage of immigrants. File a complaint against scammer by calling the New Americans Hotline at **1-800-566-7636** between 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Monday - Friday. To check if your lawyer is currently registered with New York State, visit the New York State's Unified Court System's <u>Attorney Search</u> website.

To check if a community-based organization and their non-lawyer staff are accredited and recognized by the federal government to help you with immigration assistance services, visit the <u>United States Department</u> of Justice.

Resources about immigration assistance services fraud, including a handbook to help provide local government and law enforcement with the tools to crackdown on immigration assistance fraud, can be found at the Protecting Immigrant New Yorkers website.

# **HEALTH SERVICES**

#### Find a Health Care Center

Certain health centers offer checkups and sick visits regardless of the person's ability to pay, insurance status or immigration status. <u>Find a Health Center</u> near you or **call 311** (for New York City) and **211** (for all other counties in New York State) and ask about your closest health center.

#### **Get Health Insurance**

Some immigrants are eligible for health insurance based on your immigration status. Visit the <u>New York State of Health</u> or a <u>Health Care Navigator</u> for assistance. If you are hearing impaired, call the TTY number at **1-800-662-1220**.

# FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

### **SNAP Eligibility**

Some immigrants may be eligible for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) which can be used to purchase food. SNAP helps low-income working people, senior citizens, the disabled and others feed their families. Find out if you're <u>eligible for SNAP</u>.

## **Find Temporary Assistance**

<u>Temporary Assistance</u> (TA) is available to some immigrants for temporary help for needy men, women and children. If you are unable to work, can't find a job, or your job does not pay enough, Temporary Assistance may be able to help you pay for your expenses.

# **Reduced Fare Metro Cards Eligibility**

MTA offers a reduced fare MetroCard for seniors or people with certain disabilities. Immigration status does not matter. Find out if you're eligible for a <u>reduced fare MetroCard</u>. You may also visit a Reduced Fare MetroCard Walk-In Center at 3 Stone Street (between Broadway and Broad Street), or visit a <u>MetroCard Bus or Van location</u>.

# **COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT**

## **Enroll Your Child in School**

Anyone over age 5 and under 21 who has not received a high school diploma is entitled to attend free public school at the school district in which they reside, no matter their immigration status. For more information on the local enrollment process, please contact your local school district. If you need assistance in determining what school district or school zone you reside in, you can **call 311** (for New York City) and **211** (for all other counties in New York State). To find your school district, visit the New York State Department of Education website.

# Know Your Rights as a Worker

The Department of Labor educates New Yorkers about employment services for individuals (such as job searches, resume development, and interviewing skills), job postings for businesses, and enforcement of labor law. Visit the <u>Department of Labor</u> to learn more about the services available to you.
